1. CALL MEETING TO ORDER  
Supervisor McGillicuddy called the meeting to order at 6:01 P.M.
2. PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE/INTRODUCTIONS  
Supervisor McGillicuddy led the Pledge of Allegiance.

The secretary called the roll of the Board.
4. PUBLIC REMARKS  
Supervisor McGillicuddy opened Public Remarks.

Leonard Provencher, 5824 Buena Parkway, Haslett, expressed appreciation to Supervisor McGillicuddy and Director Severy for their attendance at Tri-County Regional Planning Commission's Non-Motorized Task Force meeting. He expressed opposition to the resolution of support for the Okemos Road Boardwalk Enhancement Grant application.

Peggy Ostrom, 3663 Van Atta Road, Okemos, spoke in opposition to the location of the proposed dog park in Legg Park and requested the Board work with the Park Commission to select an alternative location. She submitted a photograph of Legg Park and urged retention of this ecosystem in its current natural state.

Tonia Olson, Director of Government and Community Relations, Granger, 16980 Wood Road, Lansing, spoke in support of House Bill 5334 and Senate Bill 725, legislation to lift the yard waste landfill ban for facilities creating renewable energy.

Vance Kincaid, 4530 Nakoma Drive, Okemos, expressed opposition to the application for the Okemos Road Boardwalk Enhancement Grant.

Ann Wood, 3921 Van Atta Road, read from a prepared statement expressing concerns over park stewardship and in opposition to the proposed dog park in Legg Park.

5. REPORTS/BOARD COMMENT/NEW WORRIES  
Supervisor McGillicuddy expressed appreciation for the detailed brochure on sign ordinance information contained in the board packet. She announced her attendance last week at CATA's Rapid Transit Study Group for Grand River Avenue, Lansing Economic Area Partnership's (LEAP) monthly meeting, Tri-County Regional Planning Commission's Non-Motorized Task Force meeting and Meridian Asset Resource Center's (MARC) Entrepreneurial Awards at the Historical Village.

Trustee LeGoff announced her visit to view the new ambulance decontamination system on October 28, 2009.

Trustee Ochberg indicated her completion of the Meridian Area Business Directory (available as an Excel file) which lists all businesses in the white pages of AT&T's August, 2009 telephone book. She urged interested people to contact her at 349-7414 or e-mail her at nlv33@comcast.net.

A. Election Report

Clerk Helmbrecht noted Meridian Township experienced an 18% voter turnout. She indicated the Township CATA millage for the Redi-Ride Service passed by 56%. Clerk Helmbrecht indicated Okemos Public Schools had a contested School Board race, while the Okemos millage passed by 80%.

Trustee Dreyfus attended the Legg Park Users Group meeting and suggested the Board work with the Park Commission and engage in dialogue to look at the issue of a dog park in Legg Park from a broader perspective.

Trustee Veenstra attended the October 28<sup>th</sup> Tri-County Regional Planning Commission meeting where a presentation was made on CATA's Clean Commute program. He spoke to the ongoing controversy at Tri-County meetings over whether or not the Eaton Country Road Commission should carry out current plans to extend Michigan Avenue approximately one mile from Canal to Creyts Road. Trustee Veenstra stated the homes which back up to that land are opposed to the road extension.

- D. Resolution of Support for Okemos Road Boardwalk Enhancement Grant Application  
**Treasurer Brixie moved to approve the attached Resolution of Support for application for a Transportation Enhancement Grant of \$299,000 and for construction of a pedestrian boardwalk along the east side of Okemos Road across the wetland south of Gaylord C. Smith Court. Seconded by Supervisor McGillicuddy.**

Board members and staff discussed the following:

- Establishment of a pathway connection for those living in Banyon Park, Bear Lake and Sapphire Lakes to walk to Meridian Mall
- Importance of addressing primary roads
- Support for the concept of boardwalk in this area due to the extensive wetlands and floodplain
- Possible use of pathway from the Meridian Service Center parking lot to the park on the north side of Central Park
- Other pathways should receive higher priority
- Section of pathway between Central Park and Gaylord C. Smith Court is the last section on the east side of Okemos Road from Jolly Road to Lake Lansing Road
- Township match would come from 2011 monies if the grant was received
- Request from the public to delay this project
- Project has been in existence for 20 years
- Concern with additional expense of Township match if grant is approved
- Suggestion for boardwalk to be constructed using recycled plastic

A. Phosphorous Fertilizer Ordinance

**By unanimous consent, the Township Board delayed discussion on this ordinance until a future meeting.**

B. Business Logos on Designated Carryout Parking Space Signs

Director Kieselbach summarized the subject matter as a result of a Zoning Board of Appeals (ZBA) decision to deny a request by a business owner to display the business logo on carry-out parking space signs as the request is not allowed by right in the ordinance.

Board members discussed the following:

- Zoning amendment would eliminate the prohibition
- Need for language to be referred to the Planning Commission
- Businesses currently using logos on parking space signs
- Logo should be limited to 10%

**It was the consensus of the Board for staff to proceed with drafting an ordinance amendment for Planning Commission review and recommendation.**

Deborah Guthrie, Station Manager and Cable Coordinator, HOM-TV, spoke to the regional effort for a community media channel which would interconnect neighboring communities' public access channel together in order to view the channel as a region. She stated this would enable viewers to keep abreast of regional information and programs. Ms. Guthrie indicated the grant money has afforded the opportunity for the Comcast system and for the purchase of the playback system equipment. She noted the playback system provides HOM-TV with the ability to playback on the AT & T system as well as Comcast. Ms. Guthrie indicated some of the current HOM-TV programming will also be broadcast on the regional channel.

Guests and Board members discussed the following areas of interest:

- Meridian Township lawsuit against Comcast regarding PEG channels
  - Contributions from other communities who have Comcast to help defray legal costs
  - All Comcast customers in Michigan have a stake in the lawsuit
- Meridian Township currently has nine (9) PEG channels: HOM-TV, Haslett Public Schools, Okemos Public Schools, East Lansing Public Schools, a public access channel out of Southfield, MI; an LCC channel and three (3) Michigan State University channels
- Interconnection for the public access channel as an important resource
- Playback system will allow simulcast on the AT&T system
- Ability for agencies such as Tri-County Regional Planning Commission to have “spots” on the regional channel
- Inquiry if Williamstown Township could air programs even though almost all residents are not on either the Comcast or AT&T systems
- All programs are currently available on demand through the Internet
- Comcast and AT&T have a vested financial interest in removing PEG channels from their lineup
- Anticipated launch date for regional media channel is Summer/Fall of 2010
- Need to recreate a public access studio to serve the public
- Long term vision to have a community media center
- Regional Media Center Board currently creating parameters for a regional media center which should be brought forward at the end of 2009 or the beginning of 2010
- Meridian Township’s cable budget is supported by franchise fees which come from the cable companies
- Cable companies profits continue to dramatically increase
- Ingham County Road Commission update on speed study for Jolly Road and Okemos Road
- Michigan statute requires submission to the State Police in order to complete the study
- After study of the data by the State Police, a public stakeholders meeting of Meridian Township, Alaiedon Township, ICRC, Okemos Public Schools and Michigan State Police personnel takes place
- Preliminary data indicates 85% of drivers on Jolly Road are driving between 50-55 mph, which is the data point focused on to set a speed limit
- School Superintendent may request a school speed zone which can be turned off and on during specific hours
- Williamstown Township installation of a school speed zone for beginning and end of the school day has decreased complaints regarding speeding by 90%
- Appreciation for preliminary patching of Mt. Hope Road between Okemos and Hagadorn Roads this year prior to major resurfacing in 2010
- Dobie Road bridge near Hatch Road will be replaced next summer
- State wide competitive grant system, administered by the Michigan Department of Transportation, for federal local bridge funding has been requested for Van Atta Road, but may take several years
- Complete street strategy looked at on a case-by-case basis by the ICRC
- Possible partnership next year between ICRC and Meridian Township to pave widened shoulders on Dobie Road between Hatch and Hamilton Roads for bicycle use
- Meridian Township road millage used for local road maintenance
- Possible elimination of the County’s 2010 local road matching funds for Meridian Township
- East Lansing projects at the regional level:
  - Michigan/Grand River Avenue Transportation Study coordinated by Capital Area Transportation Authority (CATA) to blend transportation uses in Meridian Township, East Lansing, Michigan State University, Charter Township of Lansing and the City of Lansing
    - CATA to conduct stakeholder meetings in the various communities in the near future
  - Michigan Avenue Corridor Improvement Authority with members from the City of Lansing, Charter Township of Lansing and City of East Lansing with establishment of individual Corridor Development Authorities
    - Possible future expansion to other authorities
    - Special assessment for properties which front on Michigan Avenue
    - Similar to a Development Authority with special assessments for operating expenses

- Can use TIF money and/or Brownfield Development Authority for development or redevelopment
- Williamstown Township:
  - Submission of a competitive energy grant partnered with Locke, Leroy and Wheatfield Townships to retrofit township buildings
    - 100 watt LED lighting in the parking lot
    - Construction of a CATA bus stop in the park
    - Community meetings to work with residents to promote the importance of retrofitting
    - Use of the township building as a “laboratory” for the public to observe
  - Working with Michigan Department of Transportation (MDOT) through use of a grant to place eight foot shoulders on Grand River from Meridian Road to Zimmer Road to accommodate non-motorized traffic
  - Possible formulation of a seven (7) year budget
  - Passage of a wind energy ordinance
    - Restrictions contained in the ordinance for more densely populated areas due to both a site and noise factor
    - Payback is approximately 30 years
  - Composting toilet to be placed in Summit Cemetery next year to serve as a demonstration
- Bath Township
  - Partnered with Dewitt Township for submission of a competitive energy grant
  - Citizen inspired “Safe Routes to Schools” project for a non-motorized pathway program from I-69 to Clark & Webster Roads
    - Desire to connect non-motorized pathways with Meridian Township and East Lansing
  - Large sewer project projected to begin next Spring through the Municipal Utility Authority with City of DeWitt, DeWitt Township and Watertown Township
  - Creation of a redevelopment district of the old downtown area
  - Creation of a Farmer’s market
  - Receipt of grant for a barrier free playground at Weisswasser Park
  - Development and approval of a strategic plan for the future of Bath Township
  - Development of a new website to communicate with residents
  - Installation of fiber optics in the Township Hall
- Progressive timing of traffic signals for roads which traverse governmental entities to accomplish smooth flowing traffic
  - Benefit of fuel efficiency
  - Climate change issue
  - Reduction in carbon emissions
  - Reduce driver frustration
  - Improve safety
- Recommended timing changes for county roads as a result of a completed signal optimization study which included progression analysis along corridors
- Ingham County does not currently have hardware or technology for interconnection in order to effectuate reliable progression and central control of the signals along corridors
  - Possible search for future grant opportunities to purchase hardware
- Grand River Avenue is a state road and inquiry should be directed to MDOT regarding progressive timing of traffic signals
- Annexation of Meridian Township land to East Lansing
  - Concern with continued annexation of Township property to East Lansing
  - One point of view would be to combine entire region into one governmental jurisdiction
  - Townships provide numerous services and a sense of democracy
  - Annexation impedes regionalism by creating a feeling of cynicism
  - Annexation erodes and destroys confidence among local residents, particularly those on the borderline of those affected properties
  - Outside developers are often involved in the process from a profit motive standpoint
  - Meridian Township belief that Michigan statute regarding annexation is unconstitutional
- Multiple school closings in Meridian Township
  - Alternative use of Wardcliff Elementary School, close to the East Lansing border, as an Asian Cultural Center once the school is closed; funding is an issue
  - Collective community approach to reopen neighborhood schools for a productive use
