1. CALL MEETING TO ORDER

Supervisor McGillicuddy called the meeting to order at 6:01 P.M.

2. PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

Supervisor McGillicuddy led the Pledge of Allegiance.

4. PUBLIC REMARKS

Supervisor McGillicuddy opened Public Remarks.

Deborah Canja, 3920 Sheldrake, Okemos, spoke in favor of the augmentation well for WUP #06-03 (Briarwood Drain).

Leonard Provenchur, 5824 Buena Parkway, Haslett, stated a Ride of Silence will be conducted tomorrow, May 17th, in Haslett to honor those who have been injured or killed while cycling on public roads.

Lynne Page, President, Briarwood Homeowners Association, 3912 Raleigh Drive, Okemos, spoke in support of WUP #06-03 (Briarwood Drain) as designed.

9. HEARINGS

- A. Wetland Use Permit #06-02 (Eyde), Georgetown
Supervisor McGillicuddy opened the public hearing at 6:27 P.M.
Director Kieselbach summarized the wetland use permit request as outlined in staff memorandum dated May 11, 2006.

Trustee Brixie inquired if there were any unresolved issues from the consultant's report in terms of what has been addressed in the new plan.

Director Kieselbach responded that the applicant attempted to do what the consultant suggested in their report and the meeting which was conducted.

Trustee Such inquired as to the definition of a vegetative flow path.

Director Kieselbach stated it is a swale or ditch which contains native vegetation which slows down the flow of water and doesn't erode away.

Trustee Veenstra pointed to the January 28, 2005 letter from the Michigan Department of Environmental Quality (MDEQ) which stated the wetlands were larger than the owner originally thought. He inquired if the owner accepted the larger wetland boundaries determined by the state.

Director Kieselbach responded he believed they did.

APPLICANT

Mark Clouse, CEO, Eyde Co., 4660 S. Hagadorn, Suite 660, East Lansing, stated the MDEQ reviewed the wetland delineations and they have been agreed upon between the applicant and the MDEQ. That letter was provided to the Township. At the Township consultant's suggestion, the applicant met with Township staff, the consultant, staff from the Ingham County Drain Commission and KEBS Engineering. At the time, the wetland concerns were discussed and addressed. As a result of that meeting, the engineering changes were made, and reflected in the revised plan presented to the Board this evening.

PUBLIC

John Anderson, 215 W. Newman Road, Okemos, spoke in opposition to WUP #06-02 (Eyde) and suggested another public hearing after the changes are reflected in the final proposal. He spoke to a lawsuit filed by citizens and alleged the Eyde Co. lost its appeal to the Michigan Supreme Court.

Trustee Veenstra requested the hearing be postponed until the Township's environmental consultant has had an opportunity to prepare a report to the Board and the Environmental Commission has had time to review the revised plans.

Public hearing procedure: (Questions for the Attorney (See Agenda Item #8))

- Q. Should we do as Trustee Veenstra suggests and hold this over, or is it appropriate to go ahead and hear what the public has to say at this hearing?
- A. I think it is appropriate to hear what the public has to say, and if you need further information from the Environmental Commission, the Board can ask for that, even during its discussion. If you feel you don't have enough information at that point, you can ask for more. I don't see any reason to not let the public speak tonight.

Supervisor McGillicuddy closed the public hearing at 6:47 P.M.

B. Land Division Ordinance

Director Kieselbach summarized the draft land division ordinance as outlined in staff memorandum dated May 11, 2006.

Charles Willems, PO Box 184, Haslett, spoke in opposition to the Land Division Ordinance as he alleged there was no reference to compliance with the State Land Division Act.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, Charter Township of Meridian, Ingham County, Michigan urges federal and state policymakers to only support legislation that: Maintains local control of the cable franchise process, Continues local control and enforcement authority of build-out requirements to ensure that all customers in their respective communities are provided services in a timely fashion agreeable to both the local units of government and said providers, Preserves local governments' ability to manage the public rights-of-way, ensures no reduction in local revenues and that Michigan's Metro Act is preserved, preserves the public, educational, and government channels that have community programming like local news, sports, plays, concerts, governmental meetings, and elections;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, a copy of this resolution is forwarded to our Congressional representatives in Washington, D.C., our state legislators in Lansing, Governor Granholm and the Michigan Townships Association.

Trustee Such moved to approve 2006 Order to Maintain Sidewalk Special Assessment District #8, Resolution #3 which approves repair and maintenance of sidewalk in portions of the following subdivisions: Everett Farms, Everett Farms No. 2, Everett Farms No. 3, Everett Farms No. 5, Everett Hills, Everett Woods, and Wood Creek Subdivision, and to defray the cost by special assessment; approves the cost estimate of \$10,543.64; determines the special assessment district; directs the making of an assessment roll, including a certificate; and authorizes notices be sent to the property owners giving 20 days notice to replace defective sidewalk. Seconded by Trustee Brixie.

11. DISCUSSION ITEMS/ENDS

Supervisor McGillicuddy opened public comment.

John Anderson, 215 W. Newman Road, Okemos, spoke in opposition to Wetland Use Permit #06-02 (Eyde), Georgetown, citing his version of legal action at various court levels.

Supervisor McGillicuddy closed public comment.

A. Wetland Use Permit #06-02 (Eyde), Georgetown

Board members and the applicant discussed the following:

- Board will place this item on for action once the wetland consultant has had an opportunity to review and comment on the amendments
- Public will have another opportunity for comment when it comes before the Board at a future date
- Applicant's consultant to meet with the Township's consultant, Township staff and the Drain Commissioner
- Possible rereferral to the Environmental Commission for input on the revised plans
- Unnecessary to have as a discussion item for a future Board meeting unless the Township's consultant finds something in the plans which does not agree with his recommendations
- Manmade retention areas are all in upland area
- Overall storm drainage plan and the size of the retention areas will be subject to the Ingham County Drain Commissioner's approval
- Frequency and mechanism of the monitoring reports
- Boring under the drain for the sanitary sewer and public water
- Process to ensure prevention of the sewer lines underneath from inverting
- Engineering will monitor to ensure special pipes are used whose joints lock together to prevent inversion
- Assurance that wetlands will remain hydrated
- Current pathway crossing to connect the two areas in the same location where utilities will be bored
- Earlier public comment came from one of the complainants in the case who sued the Township
- Remand back to Judge Manderfield's court who initially ruled in the Township's favor

The consensus of the Board was to direct staff to provide reports on the revised plan from the Township's wetland consultant, the Environmental Commission and the approval of the Drain Commissioner for the next Board meeting and place this item on for action at the June 6, 2006 meeting.

B. Land Division Ordinance

Director Kieselbach stated that the Community Planning and Development staff is working with the Township attorney regarding suggested changes. Staff will provide a strike-out/highlight draft document for the next Board meeting packet.

Reference(s) to the state act in the Land Division Ordinance: (Questions for the Attorney (See Agenda Item #8))

- Q. Mr. Willems made reference that this ordinance needs to comply with the state act and he was referencing something in particular. Are we doing as he suggested, or is that not the case?
- A. I believe what he was suggesting is that somewhere in the ordinance it should state that this is to comply with the Land Division Act. I believe it states that throughout the ordinance, but when we look at it again, we will make sure if there is something missed as far as a reference to the state act, we will add it. There are references to the state act throughout this ordinance.

Board members discussed the following:

- Could subdivision regulations in ordinance format possibly require a ZBA variance
- Waiver of standards which apply to the subdivision regulations would be subject to Township Board approval
- Board cannot waive a zoning standard
- Cluster sanitary sewer systems is common name used by the state and the county and allowance is in a new state act
- Definition of a flag shaped lot

The consensus of the Board was to place this item on for action at the June 6, 2006 Board meeting.

C. Draft Tree Preservation Ordinance

Supervisor McGillicuddy suggested the Supervisor, Clerk and Treasurer meet with the Township attorney, Planning staff, the Township forester and a member of the Environmental Commission to condense this draft ordinance with the land clearing ordinance and bring back to the Board. She emphasized consistency in the approach that is taken.

Board members discussed the following:

- Belief this draft ordinance is a solution in pursuit of a problem

The consensus of the Board was to move this draft ordinance forward, which will be brought back to the Board at a future meeting with significantly different language.

Supervisor McGillicuddy recessed the meeting at 7:36 P.M.

Supervisor McGillicuddy reconvened the meeting at 7:47 P.M.

12. VISION SESSION/ENDS:

A. Recycling Initiatives

Keith Granger, Chief Executive Officer, Granger Container Service, 16980 Wood Road, Lansing, offered the following:

- Granger initiated letters to all Meridian Township single family residents offering curbside recycling at no additional cost beginning July 10th
- Free recycling will remove the financial barriers which would prevent recycling
- Previously discussed financial ramifications of mandatory recycling should no longer be an issue because of free service
- Option of choice to select a collection provider
- Granger currently in discussions regarding types of services for yard waste collection
- Free recycling as a service provider issue which serves Granger's customer base

Coy Sheets, Residential Marketing Representative, Waste Management, 48797 Alpha Drive, Wixom, MI, Brian Conaway, Community and Municipal Relationships Manager and Jeff Wilson, District Manager, Lansing District offered the following:

- Waste Management the leader of recycling in the United States
- Waste Management has established services and facilities
- Waste Management tracks participation and volumes
- Waste Management has developed educational programs within school systems and communities
- Willingness to work with the Board and the community to establish educational programs

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- Board suggestions to have a waste hauler offer services which would increase recycling, amount of recycling and number and type of items which can be recycled at the curb
- Grass root efforts in recycling start in the schools and the peer pressure the students bring home to their parents through videos and curriculum programs
- Reinforcement of the importance of recycling on our natural resources

Board members and invitees discussed the following:

- Primary focus is to increase the opportunities and amount of recycling for single family residents
- Interest in looking at curbside recycling for the large number of multi-family units in the Township
- Discussion of what to do with the Township's current Transfer Station to have the total community covered for recycling efforts
- Costs of providing "free" curbside recycling
- Per household figure of how much the service would cost and items which could be recycled at curbside
- Current \$7.75/month charge for Granger curbside recycling in addition to waste
- Current \$5.00/month charge for Waste Management curbside recycling in addition to waste
- Both providers have a volume based program for waste
- Items to be included in Granger's "no additional cost" curbside recycling: newspapers, glossy magazines and catalogs, junk mail, food and beverage glass (clear and brown), tin cans, aluminum, #2 plastic milk jugs, #2 colored plastic bottles and jugs, #1 PETE plastic bottles and jugs
- Addition of #1 plastic to Granger's current recycling roster
- Difficulty in enforcement of multi-family curbside recycling
- Possibility of providing a conveniently located drop off recycling facility within the Township for multi-family tenants
- Exploration of a drop off center for hard to handle items (cardboard, hazardous materials, televisions, computer monitors) at a later date
- Waste hauler partnership with the Township to establish an easily accessible drop-off location for "hard to dispose" items
- Negligible amount of receivables uncollected due to non-payment as the service is paid for in advance on a quarterly basis
- No tracking mechanism for residential "donated" trash
- "Donated" trash more prevalent in the commercial sector environment
- Address "donated" trash in the commercial sector through container lock systems and stickers which post fines for illegal dumping
- Waste Management has new trucks which are capable of dumping front load and curbside recycling
- Recycled materials from Waste Management is transferred to Williamston then hauled in aluminum trailers to a recycling facility in Grand Rapids
- Waste Management operator performs a two (2) sort system curbside (ridges and fibers)
- Waste Management currently picks up cardboard and box board curbside with limitations
- Providing a free service does not equate into higher consumer participation
- Granger curbside recycling is sorted at the curb into a variety of compartments to increase efficiency
- Items which are not recyclable are left in the container at the curb after pickup
- Granger and Waste Management both have single vendor contracts and single subscription service with other municipalities
- Mills prefer that boxboard not be included in the corrugated bale which goes to market
- Granger provides school tours of its facility for a hands-on educational experience
- Vendor cooperation with the Township to use informational vehicles (HOM-TV, *Meridian Monitor*, Township website) to promote recycling
- Impact of refuse/recycling trucks on Township roads
- In a free market system, the final price is controlled by the provider
- Request for proposal (RFP) process could be conducted at no cost to the Township while other alternatives are explored

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- Board opportunity to hear community response to statements made this evening by the Board and both providers
- Board member request for each provider to supply its current charges, a list of acceptable recyclable items and the number of customers currently served within Meridian Township
- Granger to be looked upon as a resource as it provides the education, tours and makes the investments within the local community

13. PUBLIC REMARKS

Supervisor McGillicuddy opened Public Remarks.

Rex Harrington, 820 Piper Road, Haslett, offered suggestions based on a discussion with 69th State Representative District candidate Mark Meadows regarding a municipal solid waste recovery program.

Judy Kindel, 2915 Margate Lane, Okemos, spoke in support of township implementation of a recycling program. She suggested there be financial incentive through a direct correlation with the amount of trash discarded and the cost for pickup of that trash.

Carl Harmon, 1924 Birchwood, Okemos, spoke in support of the Board's efforts relative to recycling and expressed concern with responsiveness if the Township implements the single vendor concept.

Tina Kahn, 734 W. Grand River Avenue, #62, Okemos, spoke in support of a monetary incentive for residents to recycle. She requested the Board consider asking the waste haulers for ideas regarding a recycling center and noted public input was critical in order to develop a good plan.

Ed Gillespie, 2692 Rockwood, East Lansing, spoke against government intervention in the free enterprise system.

John Anderson, 215 W. Newman, Okemos, spoke in support of recycling and against monopolies and government intervention in free enterprise.

Manager Richards noted there has been no discussion by Township staff or the focus groups regarding a millage to support refuse collection or recycling within the Township.

Supervisor McGillicuddy closed Public Remarks.
